NEW RESERVE

Lapstone Hill

VESTED IN SHIRE COUNCIL

The Department of Lands recent-
ly vested in the Blue Mountains
Shire Council 100 acres of land for
reserves purposes at Glenbrook, on
a fine promontory adjacent to
Lapstone Hotel and situated be-
tween Knapsack Gully and Wilson's
Way.

Council decided to name it Lapstone
Hill Reserve. It is a magnificent area,
and is practically a tableland, well
timbered, and from many vantage
points on it there are extensive views
possibly unequalled in any part of the
State. At present this area is reached
by leaving the Great Western highway,
in a northerly direction, a short dis-
tance westward of the Glenbrook School
of Arts, but it is the intention of the
Shire to improve an old existing track
at the side of Lennox Bridge in the
near future, and thus give nearer access.

This reserve towers above the steep
pinch in what was formerly known as
Lapstone Hill at the rise of the Old
Bathurst Road, and, in fact, forms sub-
stantially the remaining portion from
which Lapstone Hill was chiselled out.
At present there is no permanent camp-
ing ground in the Blue Mountains
Shire, and it is the intention of the
Council to equip this reserve with all
modern requirements and popularise it
as a camping reserve, and it is reason-
able to anticipate that it will prove a
popular investment and a boom to
holiday seekers.

At the meeting of Council on Wed-
nesday £40 was voted for the improve-
ment of the reserve.
