


# BLAXLAND, N.S.W. - HOTELS - PILGRIM INN

(Left) The Old Pilgrim Inn, Blaxland, erected in 1822, was the first inn in Penrith and was catered for by the great traffic of the main Western Road. With the arrival of the railway its usefulness departed and it became a private residence.



at Blaxland 38 1/2 miles from Sydney, but not in the present open road

erected on a 320 grant (1849/51) to General Dwyer. 1822's Road, by Leg 80, and Mitchell's Road was sometimes at this Inn. Built by William Wilkinson who was later killed by a wild bull.

Building was mostly weatherboard and stone, and was verandahed, and shingle roof. It was one of James Conyers', large well and stocked. Wilson had some 1840.

James Wilson (1840's) James Conyers (1840's) was lost (1850-1860) John Wilson was (1855-1860) Henry Jones (1850), Lewis Jones (1850).

John Wilson was again lost (1850-1860) - but was found in 1860. When he left, he became prominent in the area, and was found in Penrith in 1860 at a road that was built by him. Died 17/10/91. Buried at 1873 cemetery with his wife.

1863 On the road to Sydney, James Conyers was killed by a wild bull. He was buried at 1863.
