 long situated in the creek.  
 When the lake is improved it will  
 be one of the best swimming places in  
 the state and will greatly add to the  
 attraction of Glenbrook. The  
 members of the club are hoping the  
 opening and first race meeting will be a  
 success. The President of the Progress  
 Association has donated a strong net  
 to stretch across the pool so that most  
 nervous swimmers may bridge in a  
 plank and feel safe even in the deep water.
