Three streets which were cut across by the new railway line are. Glen Street, Mann Street, Ross Street. It is suggested that the southern portion of these be re-named—as Lewis Street, perpetuating the name of an early supervisor on the construction of the road over the Riue Mounthe road over the Blue Moun-

Wright Street, honouring the name of MacKee Wright (descen-

dants of whom live in the street).
Watson Street, also connected
with the construction of the first
Blue Mountains road.
The portion of Park Road
which runs from Green Street,

along the mountain side of Glen-brook Park to be re-named as Hammett Street, recognising a pioneer family whose descendants (the Hunter family) reside in Glenbrook.

On some maps Park Road is shown as turning the corner, but

shown as turning the corner, but by common usage is known at Ross Street, which it joins on the southern side of the park.

The association suggests the name be Ross Street, which in effect, means that Ross Street would extend from the highway to the railway station.

Also on some maps Railway Terrace is shown, this on the other end joins Wascoe Street and the association suggests the whole becomes Wascoe Street They will also suggest that Glenbrook Road, which officially ends at Levy Street, be extended as Glenbrook Road to Railway Street, this portion is now known as Bennett Street.

Mention was made of the fact that on the southern and Levy

Mention was made of the fact that on the southern end, Levy Street wanders off into a bush track; this will be further dis-cussed at next meeting.
